SUMMARY OF THE WORLD CLIMATE WARMING SUMMIT



The week of December 7, representatives of 195 nations reached a landmark accord that will commit countries to lowering planet-warming greenhouse gas emissions and help ward off the most drastic effects of climate change. Traditionally, climate pacts have required developed economies like the United States to take action to lower greenhouse gas emissions, but they have exempted developing countries like China and India from such obligations. The core of the Paris deal is a requirement that every nation take part.

Ahead of the Paris talks, governments of 186 nations put forth public plans detailing how they would cut carbon emissions through 2025 or 2030. The plans vary vastly in scope and ambition. While every country is required to put forward a plan, there is no legal requirement dictating how, or how much, countries should cut emissions. However, the Paris accord has built in a series of legally binding requirements so that countries increase the stringency of their climate change policies in the future. Countries will be required to reconvene every five years, starting in 2020, with updated plans that would tighten their emissions cuts. Countries will also be legally required to reconvene every five years starting in 2023 to publicly report on how they are doing in cutting emissions compared to their plans. They will monitor and report on their emissions levels and reductions using a universal accounting system.

President Obama, who regards tackling climate change as a central element of his legacy, spoke of the deal in a televised address from the White House: "This agreement sends a powerful signal that the world is fully committed to a low-carbon future," he said. "We've shown that the world has both the will and the ability to take on this challenge."

MISSOURI PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION SCHEDULES RATE INCREASE HEARINGS

Missouri-American Water Company is seeking to increase base rates for water and sewer by 19.63%. Due to a temporary surcharge in St. Louis County being rolled into the permanent rate, the revenue requirement would be approximately 9.73%. In addition, a Revenue Stabilization Mechanism and Environmental Cost Adjustment Mechanism are included in the filing. ***These measures deal with costs to comply with new federal, state and local environmental regulations.***

INITIATIVE PETITIONS FOR NOVEMBER 2016 GENERAL ELECTION

As the 2016 election year gets underway, the signature seekers for the Initiative Petitions for the ballot are also appearing at libraries, community centers, and other public venues. A bumper crop of over 200 have been submitted with 90 proposals currently on the list approved for signatures. The good news is that these include multiple. That leaves a possible 30 to be circulated, if the sponsors of the petitions can raise the necessary funds to acquire the necessary signatures.

The number of Required Signature Petitions proposing statutory changes must be signed by five percent of legal voters in any six of the eight congressional districts. Petitions proposing constitutional changes must be signed by eight percent of legal voters who voted in 2012 Gubernatorial election. in any six of the eight congressional districts. That is, 5% of the number of votes cast in the Gubernatorial election in 2012, or 8% of the votes cast in the 2012 Gubernatorial election. In 2012, there were 345,026 votes cast in the 1st Congressional District, 404,209 votes cast in the 2nd Congressional District, and 351,362 in the 3rd Congressional District. Votes cast in the eight districts range from 304,975- 404,209. The number of signatures necessary to place a petition on the ballot ranges from approximately 96,00 – 150,000, depending whether it is a statute or a constitutional amendment and the districts in which signatures are solicited. The investment in the petition must be sizeable in order to cover all of the costs.

Several of the topics appear to have the backing necessary to accomplish this. One is the addition of a cigarette tax. Three groups are presently working toward certification. The Raise Your Hand for Kids establishes and funds a commission for facilitating Early Childhood Education and Health. A second group proposing a cigarette tax increase is a coalition of Missouri Petroleum Marketers and the Convenience Store Association, proposing a much lower increase to fund transportation. An additional group is proposing raising the cigarette tax to aid Childhood Cancer Treatment and Prevention. Several versions of each have been submitted.

Prohibiting new state sales and use taxes, campaign ethics, and the minimum wage are also hot items.

Enhancing the adoption and inclusion in the power grid of alternative energy, legalizing marijuana for medicinal use and recreational use, limiting the power of the Missouri Board of Education and local boards of education; and eliminating term limits, reducing the age requirement, and reducing the numbers for Missouri Legislators are just a few of the proposals approved for signatures. All Signature Petitions must be filed at the Secretary of State’s office in Jefferson City by 5:00pm. on May 8, 2016.

A simple majority is needed for an Initiative Petition to become law.

TRANSPORTATION FUNDING IN MISSOURI

Missouri Constitution Article IV, Section 30a on Transportation: Since this portion of the constitution was written, life has changed creating a great disparity in taxation. Local governments (counties, cities and towns) receive a quarter of highway taxes for streets and bridges. MoDOT receives the rest. But the current formula for distributing revenues results in gross inequity and reduces safety.

Drivers in 5 MO counties of the **St. Louis area pay half** of the gas tax paid in the state. The 5 counties include St. Louis, St. Charles, St. Louis City, Jefferson and Franklin counties.

Yet St. Louis **receives less than a quarter (23%)** of these taxes transferred to local governments per the MO Constitution.

As a result, the St. Louis area has **70% of the traffic on locally owned critical bridges** which are eligible for federal funds in the state.

The required **repairs of these heavily traveled, critical bridges would cost \$290 million**. Plus another \$70 million for critical bridges without federal aid. Bad roads and bridges increase auto repair, gas use, and congestion. St. Louis' drivers lose \$1,511 every year in added costs. Road features are a contributing factor in approximately one-third of fatal traffic crashes.

Withholding funds for highway and bridge construction **exports highway construction jobs** away from the most populous area in the state. This harms both local majority and minority businesses.



Unfair, Zero Transit Funding from Highway Taxes: The MO Constitution does not permit highway taxes to be used for public transit.

Many states dedicate 15-20% of highway taxes to various forms of public transit.

Inadequate public transportation damages our communities. It limits access to: health care, jobs, education, shopping, entertainment... For decades, parts of St. Louis have posted some of the **worst infant mortality rates** in the nation. Lack of prenatal care due to inadequate healthcare and limited public transportation has been cited as a major cause of infant mortality in poor neighborhoods. Some St. Louis neighborhoods have 3-4 times more infant deaths than the national average - exceeding that of Third World Countries.

Change MO Constitution's transportation section to increase safety and equity: Allocate taxes to local governments based on taxes paid and/or need: number of drivers, local traffic, number of vehicles... Also dedicate 15-20% of highway taxes to public transit. To ensure gas tax proceeds are spent equitably within the state, many states have developed a distribution formula based on some combination of resident population, registered motor vehicles, and highway miles.

It's time that the St. Louis members of the legislature work together to change unsafe and unfair transportation sections of the MO Constitution.

Health care news: Insured Population Increases

Cover Missouri Coalition reported that as of January 2, 2016 the total enrollments in federally-funded marketplace plans were 8,608,332. **Missouri's total enrollments were at 258,696!** With open enrollment through the month of January, both national and state totals are sure to increase.

Warning: penalties continue to increase each year for those without insurance. This year, the penalty is \$695 per adult and \$347 per child up to a family cap of \$2,500 or 2.5% of household income, whichever is greater. We still leave approximately 300,000 persons unable to afford a Marketplace Plan or uneligible to buy through the Marketplace because they do not earn at least 100% of Federal Poverty Level.

There is a Pill for That!

Caution: it will probably cost you more to fill that prescription. Congress has taken notice. Senators Susan Collins (R-Maine) and Claire McCaskill (D-Missouri) are working through the Senate Special Committee on Aging to investigate and review increasing costs. Isn't it a shame there is no price-negotiation for Medicare Part D drug coverage?

Chronic conditions? That will really cost you! Rx Price Watch, policy review from AARP, noted the 2013 average annual cost for drugs treating chronic conditions was more than \$53,000, more than double the annual median income for Medicare beneficiaries. They state that overall "...prices of widely used brand-name drugs increased by nearly 13%..." in that same year.

Both Federal and State efforts are moving to control the use of Opioids. Missouri House Bill 1892 would establish a drug monitoring program. The use of pain killers has increased and these strong drugs often end up in the wrong hands. Need to get rid of drugs still in your household? Most Police Departments have prescription drug disposal programs. Be safe. Be responsible.
