## AMEREN VICE PRESIDENT UPDATES LEAGUE ON THE STATUS OF "GREEN" POWER IN MISSOURI

Ameren UE is working hard to deliver "green" power to customers, keep prices low and increase efficiency -- and it's succeeding better than many people think, although many problems remain. That's the message Stephen Kidwell, Ameren's vice president for Regulatory Affairs, brought to an enthusiastic audience at the League's annual Holiday Party, Dec. 6 at the Viking Restaurant in Sunset Hills.

Kidwell surprised his listeners by telling them that Ameren's rates in the St. Louis area are among the lowest in the nation -- 6.88 cents per kilowatt hour, versus a national average of 10.8 cents. Since 1991, he said, rates here have gone down 10 percent, while the national average has increased 30 percent. If our electric bills are higher, he said, it's because we use more power -- for computers, bigger houses, outside lights and more. Thus, he said, though the *rate* of growth in electrical use is declining, actual growth is increasing.

Ameren's Power On is a \$1 billion program to improve the reliability and environmental responsibility of power. Tree trimming, "undergrounding" and facilities inspections (of poles and other service installations) are three of the most effective means of insuring reliable power delivery, he said.

Putting lines underground is almost prohibitively expensive, he noted; there are only 40 miles' worth of new underground wires in the entire state of Missouri.

Ameren will need a new power plant between 2018 and 2020, Kidwell told the League; it will cost from six to nine billion dollars, and the decision to build must be made by 2011.

Ameren is also "committed to adding the first 100 megawatts of wind power to our system before the end of 2009," Kidwell said. However, the only two wind-generating areas in Missouri are in the northwest and northeast corners, he added, and getting wind power from its main source (the central plains) to where it's needed is still a problem. Other types of clean power generation are less promising, Kidwell indicated. Solar power is "very expensive compared to other sources....and at least 10 to 20% costlier than coal." In the area of hydro-electric generation, Ameren is "looking at some smaller projects." The utility is also working on CCS -- Carbon Capture and Sequestration -- a technology to trap carbon emissions and inject them into existing geological formations.

Nuclear energy is still an option, he said. Ameren would get tax credits for starting a nuclear project by 2008, so it has started the licensing process with an option to build, Kidwell said, with "no decisions yet" on the project.

Mr. Kidwell responded to questions from the audience of some 55 League members. Prior to his talk, President Doris Buzzell presented a gift to Julie Behrens in appreciation for her devoted extra work for the League in the past few months; members gave Julie a standing ovation. Kathleen Farrell won the gift basket raffle, and Janice Dahl outbid other contenders to win the League framed print donated by Agnes Garino.
